### Thompson Ledges Celebrates A New Chapter

Known for striking rock formations, deep crevices, bubbling springs, and panoramic views, Thompson Ledges have long been a beloved natural landmark. Once a popular 19th-century picnic spot, the area became Geauga County's first public park in 1941.

Over time, littering and vandalism took a toll. Dedicated park commissioners often spent countless volunteer hours removing trash and scrubbing graffiti from the ledges to preserve this community gem.

A major turning point came with a generous gift from the Francis Spatz Leighton Trust. Francis, a Thompson native and acclaimed author, left a bequest to create a wildlife refuge on her family's land. When that plan proved unworkable, the trust funded the development of a new indoor Nature and Learning Center, surrounded by themed outdoor features celebrating the forces of nature and human history.

Designed by retired Geauga Park District Naturalist and former Foundation for Geauga Parks Trustee, Dan Best, the interpretive plan includes engaging indoor exhibits—like a 3D diorama of the Sharon Conglomerate rock face—and outdoor panels on geology, ecology, and wildlife. Playful elements like wildlife silhouettes and a black bear sculpture add family-friendly charm.

To honor Dan's lifelong dedication, the Thompson Ledges Park Commission has created the Dan Best Nature Awareness Fund through the Foundation for Geauga Parks. This permanent fund will help preserve Thompson Ledges and its Nature Center for generations to come.



At the August Foundation for Geauga Parks Board of Trustees' meeting, Matt McCue, Deputy Director of the Geauga Park District (GPD), shared an update that left us in awe of the work accomplished to preserve and enhance Geauga County's natural spaces.

Today, the Park District manages more than 10,700 acres of land across 25 open parks and preserves. Of that, about 8,200 acres are open to the public, while the rest are conservation properties carefully stewarded for future generations.

To truly appreciate the Park District's impact, Matt walked us through just the past 20 years of growth (2005–2025):

- 4,948 acres of new land under management
- · 9,095 linear feet of restored streams
- 31 acres of wetland restoration
- 180 acres of meadow restoration
- 16,281 native trees planted

And that's only half the story. In the same time frame, the Park District built:

- 13 new parks
- 9 shelters
- 10 enclosed lodges
- 8 playgrounds
- 20 restroom facilities

These aren't just numbers—this Park District work is trails walked, picnics shared, children playing, and habitats restored. It's an incredible investment in the quality of life for everyone in Geauga County.

Looking ahead, the next five years of GPD's Strategic Plan will emphasize maintaining and upgrading existing parks and facilities, while also working to connect open spaces throughout the county-like expanding the Maple Highlands Trail.

The Foundation is deeply grateful for the tireless work of the Geauga Park District staff and leadership. Their dedication ensures that our parks remain vibrant, welcoming, and resilient, safeguarding both the natural world and the community's access to it.

#### ON THE BALLOT THIS NOVEMBER

The Geauga Park District Board of Commissioners has placed a 20-year, 1.2-mill renewal and increase levy on the ballot. If approved, the levy will help fund capital improvement projects and operating expenses. For homeowners, the cost would be approximately \$23 per year per \$100,000 property valuation (Geauga County Auditor).

With a workplace culture that can be described as "everyone having each other's back," Burton Station Fixture in Middlefield goes about its business quietly growing while giving back to the community.

The manufacturer of custom commercial casework and retail store display fixtures began operations near Chagrin Falls and moved to its current location at 15240 Burton-Windsor Road, in 2008, just as a major downturn hit the markets. Tyler Pollari, who with brother, Travis, joined their father, Mark, the founder of Burton Station Fixture, in the business, said the company realized quickly it would have to pivot to withstand the economic downturn. Since then, investments in state-of-the-art fabricating equipment have moved the needle. Now a regional leader in custom cabinetry and countertops, residents may have seen Burton Station Fixture custom work in a local business like Wild Eagle Saloon.

One of the interesting twists in their business has been manufacturing sauna parts. The smell of freshly cut red cedar from the western United States and Canada fills one large area of the 36,000-square-foot facility. Neatly stacked pieces of cedar are ready for use in Sisu Lifestyle sauna kits, a growing product line supplied by Burton Station Fixture. The sauna business taps into the family's Nordic roots. Tyler, who serves as senior project manager, said his grandfather's parents emigrated from Finland and settled in the Huntsburg/Middlefield area.

As a family business it's not surprising that Tyler, 37, Travis, 34, and Mark have created a strong team. "We're like a minivan with a NASCAR engine inside," Tyler said, noting the statement is one of Mark's favorite quips. "I've been working here in some capacity since I was 16," Tyler said, noting that he has a "really good" relationship with his father and brother. The company employs several members of the Amish community, with whom Burton Station Fixture has strong ties. "We are stewards of the good relationship we have with the [Amish] community," Tyler said. Many of the company's team members have been working there for 10 or more years.

Of the company's commitment to the Foundation for Geauga Parks, Tyler said, "we all appreciate the park program in Geauga County." "For those of us that spend most of the workday sitting at a desk, the Geauga Park District offers a necessary escape to nature. A place where we can all slow down a bit and leave behind our fast-paced jobs, even for just a moment. "I really value having a relationship with the natural world and having access to public lands in the county," Tyler said. The Foundation for Geauga Parks is helping to make it happen.



When Tyler Pollari isn't crafting custom wood case pieces and display units, you'll likely find him pedaling through the scenic roads of Geauga County — or lending a hand at a youth cycling group in the Geauga Park District.

For the past two years, Tyler has been a dedicated volunteer with the Shenanigans Adventure Bike Club, a vibrant program for kids ages 5 to 12. Meeting weekly at Big Creek in Chardon, the club focuses on more than just biking — it's about building confidence, resilience, and life skills. Adventure Bike Club is a non-competitive, outdoor-based initiative that encourages kids to challenge themselves in a supportive environment.

"Our mantra is 'do hard things," Tyler explains. Over the course of the eight-week camp, young riders not only strengthen their biking abilities but also forge friendships and learn to support one another. Tyler finds it especially rewarding to watch kids use their newfound skills to help each other with bike repairs — a true testament to the club's spirit.
